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Where's our fair share, Premier?

An empty basket is all we get after the Baird Liberal Government handed down its State Budget in June, short-changing our community. Yet again, the Baird Liberal Government has completely ignored the needs of the Macquarie Fields electorate.

The State Budget did not include a single dollar for vital projects like the upgrade to Macquarie Fields station or more commuter railway parking. This is despite the billions of dollars the Baird Liberal Government has been raking in from stamp duty through property transactions.

On top of the closure of the motor registry offices in Ingleburn and Campbelltown and the sale of the Hurlstone Farm, our ambulance station at Macquarie Fields will be downgraded and may face eventual closure. It is clear that the Baird Government doesn't care about our needs.

“The complete lack of regard for my community's needs is insulting! We pay our taxes and we pay our stamp duty. We deserve our fair share.”

Chat with Anoulack...

Principal of James Meehan High School, Gail Taylor, recently retired after 23 years at the school, and another 14 years in the Education Sector. Some of her best memories are of making a difference in students' lives.

HOW DID YOU COME TO WORK AT JAMES MEEHAN?

I taught at various schools across Western Sydney, before starting at James Meehan High School as the History head teacher. I stayed on because of the school's wonderful sense of community.

TELL ME ABOUT THE VALUE OF PARTNERSHIPS.

The most important partnership is with the students' families and carers but, aside from this, we have established important ties with the University of NSW, the Beacon Foundation, UnitingCare and The Smith Family. I believe in the African proverb 'It takes a village to raise a child', and our partnerships are certainly reflective of that.

THE SCHOOL HAS BUILT BRIDGES INTERNATIONALLY TOO?

Yes, James Meehan has an international exchange program with a school in China, which compliments the introduction of Mandarin language studies at the school. James Meehan also has a relationship with a school in Kenya and helps support five schools in Samoa. With 35 per cent of our student population from the Pacific region, this relationship has helped build greater cultural understanding among our students and their families.

HOW IS JAMES MEEHAN HELPING YOUNG PEOPLE REACH THEIR GOALS?

We offer an outreach program called ASPIRE which aims

to increase students' educational aspirations and help them access a university education. The school offers a range of vocational educational opportunities and we pride ourselves on our industrial kitchen which gives students practical hospitality skills training.

WHAT IS JAMES MEEHAN DOING TO SUPPORT STUDENTS' MENTAL HEALTH?

We have an excellent well-being program at James Meehan, which focuses on building students' resilience. We were the first school in Australia to install a conversation bench provided by the RUOK? Foundation. The bench is a place where staff and students can have meaningful conversations, and friends can check in on each other.

NAME SOME OF YOUR FONDEST MEMORIES.

Helping to make a difference in young peoples' lives, above all else. At the school's recent Open Day, it was rewarding to learn all of the amazing things some of my former students had achieved. I will always remember the students, as well as the school's dedicated and passionate staff.
