
When will the Liberal Government deliver its promised 700 new car parking spaces at Edmondson Park? I have sought urgent answers from the NSW Transport Minister.

WHERE'S OUR LIFT, PREMIER?

The Liberal Government continues to ignore the urgent need for a lift at Macquarie Fields Station. Not a single cent was spent on upgrading Macquarie Fields Station under this Liberal Government between 1 July 2018 and 30 July 2019. The Liberal Government's contempt for our local area is appalling.

There are 70 steps at Macquarie Fields Station. The station is on the Airport line. People with disabilities or mobility issues, parents with prams, people with luggage and the elderly are forced to climb the steps or use another station. It is simply not good enough.

To make matters worse, this Liberal Government's shameless bias of station upgrades is grossly unfair and defies their own merit-based assessment. An accessibility upgrade at Como Station (in a Liberal seat) is underway after it was ranked 35 in terms of need - ahead of Macquarie Fields Station (ranked 34).

Yet patronage at Como Station is 8,160 passengers per week, compared to 10,598 passengers per week at Macquarie Fields Station.

And despite these facts the Liberal Government still ignores our needs. Como gets a lift and we don't, Premier? Where's our fair share?

COMMUTERS FEEL THE SQUEEZE!

From Leumeah through to Glenfield, our commuter car parks are feeling the squeeze.

The Liberal Government's overdevelopment agenda has meant our suburbs are growing – and growing fast – but growth is not being matched by infrastructure investment.

Local commuters have endured years of inaction by the Liberal Government. As a result, the chronic shortage of commuter car parking has reached crisis point across south west Sydney.

Commuters are at their wit's end, with many resorting to desperate measures such as leaving hours earlier for work or parking illegally.

I call on the Liberal Government to commit to long overdue infrastructure, including an investment in more commuter car parking to meet our growing community's needs. All we want is our fair share.

LUKE, HOW DID YOU GET INVOLVED IN DEBATING?
